# Time to reflect

"I am the good shepherd". It's a bucolic image; gentle wind causing grass to wave, spring lambs jumping around fields, warm sun on the face. We like this image. It comforts us, reassures us that Jesus will care for us, protect us from all that harms, ensure that we are in a place of rest and refreshment. "And relax" as they say. Isn't it so lovely to be one of the sheep?

Well, to be fair, if you just read part of the gospel set for today, you might come away with that image. It plays into one of those motifs we perhaps inherited from Sunday School, of gentle Jesus, meek and mild and which subtly suggests that we, too, would be ought to aspire to gentility.

Read on and you find that being a shepherd carries serious implications. It's less about cuddling lambs (the image that we most often find in stained glass windows) and more about fighting off the powers of darkness and destruction. Jesus clearly knows this, talking about laying down his life, about the autonomy to choose, about the responsibility that comes with the title "shepherd".

One of the temptations we have is to sentimentalise Jesus, to drench his ministry in saccharine and thereby also to turn the Christian life into a mushy, woolly, ill-defined message which can be reduced to "being kind to cats". If we learn to take Jesus seriously, to take his love seriously, in all its commitment, all its investment, all its riskiness, then we can rediscover our call to also be serious shepherds, walking his way, caring for his flock.

### Glory to You, O Lord

The hired hand runs away because a hired hand does not care for the sheep. I am the good shepherd. I know my own and my own know me, just as the Father knows me and I know the Father. And I lay down my life for the sheep. I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold. I must bring them also, and they will listen to my voice. So there will be one flock, one shepherd. For this reason the Father loves me, because I lay down my life in order to take it up again. No one takes it from me, but I lay it down of my own accord. I have power to lay it down, and I have power to take it up again. I have received this command from my Father."
