Time to reflect

I love the film "Whisky Galore". It's gentle depiction of the Scottish Island communities, divided by denomination, united by a devotion to a drop of whisky, scandalised by an over-the-top application of the law, is rather wonderful. Part of the jeopardy of the film lies in the danger of the S.S. Cabinet Minster sinking before the whisky can be "rescued" and of how the stern requirements of Sabbath observance weighed heavily on the devote but thirsty islanders. When I first saw it, I was amazed at the austerity of the Sabbatarian tradition. 1970s Britain was itself pretty buttoned up regarding what you could and could not do on a Sunday but the film offered a portrayal of biblical literalism that was deeply novel and challenging.

I wonder how we observe the third commandment? Do we avoid shopping (or rescuing Whisky)? The "Keep Sunday Special" campaign now argue not for keeping Sunday special as a "holy day" but as a necessary rest for those caught up in service industries (catering, food outlets, shops). And, in doing that, they have rightly understood this commandment to be understood in economic and human terms just as much as religious ones. It seeks to answer the question "Who are we who worship God?" It says that the Israelites are people who experienced a very different past (slavery) to their present economic prosperity. The third commandment tells us that worship of God connects us to the real world, to our neighbours and their circumstances. How can we embrace this commandment and make it real for ourselves today?

(*Deuteromony 5. 12 – 15*)

Glory to You, O Lord

One sabbath Jesus was going through the cornfields; and as they made their way his disciples began to pluck heads of grain. The Pharisees said to him, "Look, why are they doing what is not lawful on the sabbath?" And he said to them, "Have you never read what David did when he and his companions

were hungry and in need of food? He entered the house of God, when Abiathar was high priest, and ate the bread of the Presence, which it is not lawful for any but the priests to eat, and he gave some to his companions." Then he said to them, "The sabbath was made for humankind, and not humankind for the sabbath; so the Son of Man is lord even of the sabbath." The Pharisees went out and immediately conspired with the Herodians against him, how to destroy him.
