# lission Action Plan One of the interesting benefits of having dual

responsibility for Bury Parish Church and St Paul's is that you get quite different experiences of life in Bury.

Here, at Bury Parish, I have heard (and shared) stories of holidays, trips out and cultural experiences (theatre, cinema, garden centres). When I listen to the parents at St Paul's, I am struck by a much more constrained set of experiences; that "going to town" means a rare trip in to Bury, not Manchester as I first thought; that meetings friends for coffee is not a financial option; that those things which enlarge our view of the world, painting, film, books, plays, are not even on the radar.

It was when I talked to one of the parents who told me that she never met other adults apart of the weekly term-time social meeting that I began to grasp that poverty comes in all sorts of ways. Poverty is not just lack of money. Poverty affects access to a wider world (transport), ability to maintain contact with others (isolation), impacts confidence and ambition (educational attainment is often low).

What has this to do with MAP? One of the areas that we might think through is how we might make use of our position in the centre of Bury to create a meeting place for isolated people? Not everyone has money to buy drinks in House on the Rock. Not all are parents who need Tiddlers. Is this something which we should explore? Is God calling us to create a centre of compassion, healing and hope for our town?

Amen.

## A reading from the Book of Joshua

(Joshua 24.1-2a, 14-18)

Then Joshua gathered all the tribes of Israel to Shechem, and summoned the elders, the heads, the judges, and the officers of Israel; and they presented themselves before God. And Joshua said to all the people, "Thus says the Lord, the God of Israel: "Now therefore revere the Lord, and serve him in sincerity and in faithfulness; put away the gods that your ancestors served beyond the River and in Egypt, and serve the Lord. Now if you are unwilling to serve the Lord, choose this day whom you will serve, whether the gods your ancestors served in the region beyond the River or the gods of the Amorites in whose land you are living; but as for me and my household, we will serve the Lord." Then the people answered, "Far be it from us that we should forsake the Lord to serve other gods; for it is the Lord our God who brought us and our ancestors up from the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery, and who did those great signs in our sight. ## Glory to You, O Lord

Jesus said to the crowd: "Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood abide in me, and I in them. Just as the living Father sent me, and I live because of the Father, so whoever eats me will live because of me. This is the bread that came down from heaven, not like that which your ancestors ate, and they died. But the one who eats this bread will live forever." He said these things while he was teaching in the synagogue at Capernaum. When many of his disciples heard it, they said, "This teaching is difficult; who can accept it?" But Jesus, being aware that his disciples were complaining about it, said to them, "Does this offend you? Then what if you were to see the Son of Man ascending to where he was before? It is the spirit that gives life; the flesh is useless. The words that I have spoken to you are spirit and life. But among you there are some who do not believe." For Jesus knew from the first who were the ones that did not believe, and who was the one that would betray him. And he said, "For this reason I have told you that no one can come to me unless it is granted by the Father." Because of this many of his disciples turned back and no longer went about with him. So Jesus asked the twelve, "Do you also wish to go away?" Simon Peter answered him, "Lord, to whom can we go? You have the words of eternal life. We have come to believe and know that you are the Holy One of God."
