Mission Action Plan

I am a member of the National Trust and, like many Trust members, enjoy visiting not just stately homes but more modest and, therefore, perhaps more recognisable houses on a more domestic scale. The Trust work hard to fill houses with appropriate furniture and decorations. There's a splendid example of back-to-back houses in Birmingham where each room echoes a different period.

It used to be, back when people invited me to visit their homes, I would see lots of books and newspapers. People wanted to take responsibility for nurturing their minds. Now that is much rarer. We seem to have lost our thirst for learning and would rather consume the narrow form of entertainment that TV and Netflix offer. In the future, National Trust houses will be full of electrical goods and little else.

This lack of desire of learning includes wanting to learn about the faith. It raises deep questions for the local church, for ministry and for mission. Is life-long learning about the Christian life only something for enthusiasts, the socially inept and clergy? Or should our own diaries bear testimony to the seriousness we give to nurturing our faith? Are we "ready (and able) to speak up and tell anyone who asks why you're living the way you are" as Peter writes (1 Pet 3.15),

Ironically electronic technology offers a partial solution. Our website (www.buryparishchurch.com) has links to thoughtful discussions of the faith. Each week we send out an ebulletin which has a short video to watch. And, for those who like to talk faith, God, Jesus, bible, Church, life, our Wednesday Study Group and Adult Sunday School offer opportunity to share wisdom. Let's commit to be a learning Church.

A reading from the Book of Deuteronomy

(Deuteronomy 4. 1-2, 6-9)

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark (Mark 7. 1-8, 14, 15, 21-23)

Glory to You, O Lord

When the Pharisees and some of the scribes who had come from Jerusalem gathered around him, they noticed that some of his disciples were eating with defiled hands, that is, without washing them. (For the Pharisees, and all the Jews, do not eat unless they thoroughly wash their hands, thus observing the tradition of the elders; and they do not eat anything from the market unless they wash it; and there are also many other traditions that they observe, the washing of cups, pots, and bronze kettles.) So the Pharisees and the scribes asked him, "Why do your disciples not live according to the tradition of the elders, but eat with defiled hands?" He said to them, "Isaiah prophesied rightly about you hypocrites, as it is written, 'This people honours me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me; in vain do they worship me, teaching human precepts as doctrines.' You abandon the commandment of God and hold to human tradition." Then he called the crowd again and said to them, "Listen to me, all of you, and understand: there is nothing outside a person that by going in can defile, but the things that come out are what defile." For it is from within, from the human heart, that evil intentions come: fornication, theft, murder, adultery, avarice, wickedness, deceit, licentiousness, envy, slander, pride, folly. All these evil things come from within, and they defile a person."
