Time to Reflect

As we have picked our way through the Mission Action Planning material, one of the key tasks has been to ask has been; "What are our values?" In other words, what do we stand for? What would be true about the community, the congregation, of Bury Parish even if the building collapsed?

It's an interesting question, a challenging one. Almost all church communities I have ever been a part of have blended their sense of faith in Christ, fellowship within the Church and loyalty towards one another with an affection for the fabric. The question about "Values" starkly reminds us that what might seem like a 50:50 divide, equally split between the people and fabric, should, in fact, be weighted way over to the faith/community side of the equation. The fabric of the building, if honoured and used well and creatively, is there solely to point us towards God.

On this last Sunday of the Church's year, our readings slide into the "Apocalyptic". The images are of "end times". There are people who would delight in matching contemporary events with the slightly off-kilter images we hear today. But that would be to mis -understand the purpose of this strange form of writing. These are not 'prophetic' foretellings of the future. Rather, in their strangeness, they invite us to imagine a world where God is present, a world where the common narratives of violence and disorder are not the only way of describing what we see.

The people who wrote these texts want to their readers (us) to keep tightly to the God-shaped values we hold in order that others see and perhaps are attracted to the very foundations, not of our building, but of our faith.
