Time to Reflect

We seem to react differently to bad news at this time of year. We somehow feel that someone has crashed the party by doing something so thoughtless as falling ill or losing a job or dying. Christmas, we tell ourselves, is meant to be time of undiminished happiness.

To hear today's gospel reading, of the sheer, uncontrollable panic of Mary and Joseph, is to bring down to earth any false feelings of sentimentality we might have about this time of year. Christmas Day itself is followed by St Stephan's Day, the day when we remember the first martyr for Christ and in the same vein, our gospel warns us off surrounding Christmas with emotional cotton wool.

Mary and Joseph take three days to find Jesus. We all have spent time looking for things; car keys, phone, shoes. And we recognise the surge of relief when, at last, we remember that we did put them somewhere odd and search there. We pick the same emotional idea up when Mary and Joseph, on the off-chance, look in on the Temple. "Duh," says Jesus, "where d'you think I would be?" Two days of panic and then a moment of blindingly obvious revelation—that their God-immersed lad would be in the one place where you could immerse yourself in the things of God. We've all been there.

Which raises a neat question; where do we look for the things of God? and do we do so naturally and instinctively, as Jesus did? And would anyone else know that about you? If not, why not?
