Time to Reflect

Today we hear a bit from Jesus' 'Sermon on the Plain'. We are more familiar with Matthew's 'Sermon on the Mount' and so to hear the shorter version of the Beatitudes and to hear these balanced out against the woes, comes as a bit of shock. It comes as a shock because we have taught ourselves not to think of Jesus speaking in negative and judgemental terms. We like Jesus to be all cuddly and affirming.

First things first. Speakers reuse material. See Winston Churchill's speeches for details. So we can easily imagine Jesus recycling his main ideas. And we can equally easily imagine that some hearers pick up one thread and others another. We should not be phased by two version of the Beatitudes.

Then we might ponder the 'woes'. Jesus, it appears, has words to say to the rich; satiated with things, relaxed about life's basics, entertained by life's many distractions. Compare and contrast, says Jesus, with those who window shop but never enter, count their pennies in Aldi and, in their depression, find life overwhelming.

Here's a way of thinking about this. Maybe Jesus is saying this; that folks with very little have a deep sense of what is important and valuable and worth looking after? The contemporary fascination with decluttering (see the many TV programmes for details) echoes this spiritual truth; that life is richer when we cease to define ourselves by what we have and learn to practice a life of simplicity, where the things of the Kingdom were to only things worth investing in.


