# Time to Reflect

Last week we heard the Transfiguration story which featured two key characters from the Old Testament, Moses and Elijah (Luke 9). The usual take on these two is that somehow encompass all the ideas we find in those texts; the Law and the Prophets and that Jesus is seen as including them in his own ministry.

Today we hear the familiar story of Jesus spending forty days in the wilderness. Actually, there are three versions of this story; today's (Luke's) and Matthew's are pretty similar. Mark's is much shorter. In the version we hear today, Jesus compresses the whole of the story of Israel into three moments of crisis. His reaction to the same issues that faced Israel show us why we should think of Jesus as the fulfilment of God's promise to create a covenant people.

Jesus is hungry. Really hungry. Hungry like the Hebrews fleeing Pharaoh in the desert. Jesus is tested to see whether he would feed himself. No. says Jesus. My call is to feed a world hungry for bread and hungry for food that will sustain the soul.

Jesus is invited to seek power over the inhabited world, to make quick inroads, win quick wins, in his ministry, to give a nod to the Evil One (and cross fingers behind his back). Just as Israel sort ill-judged friendship with Egypt, Assyria and so on. 'Off' he says

And Jesus is invited to become a "Bible believer", to throw himself off a tower, to be a fundamentalist, to live by the Letter of the Law. Nope, says Jesus. Don't hide behind the bible. Stand in front of God.

# A reading from the letter of Paul to the Romans (Romans 10.8b-13)

What does scripture say?
