# Time to Reflect

If you wander into the Rectory Gardens, you may well come across Nando, Kentucky and Dixie, our hens. When I see them pottering around the flower beds, I am reminded of our gospel reading today, where Jesus uses the image of himself as a mother hen, desiring to bring a wayward brood back into a place of safety. Hold that thought for a moment.

The Church of England is celebrating 25 years of the ordination of women to the priesthood. As time has moved on, it is easy to forget the journey, the long journey, that this took, easy to forget the pain and sorrow (on both sides of the decision), easy to take for granted what riches the Church finally welcomed, when it welcomed women into the priesthood.

And Jesus, in our passage, describes himself as a mother hen. He recognises in himself the necessary mothering instinct that not all have, to welcome, include and shelter the very group that were becoming increasingly hostile to him. Jesus brings to the table a passionate, pastoral care, not just for his own flock, but also for these awkward, irritating, disruptive crew. Jesus wanted a diverse community.

We need to be cautious about stereotyping, wary of imagining that men work in one way and women in another. We can say, however, that by including women in the ministerial and priestly mix, the Church maximises the potential of the richness of human nature on the level of gender. But, before we become too proud, we still have a long way to go to truly reflect humanity's richness in terms of cultural, ethnic, sexual and disability diversity among both lay people and the ordained. Let's seek to change that.
