In the bathroom cabinet there is a nearly empty bottle of eau-de-cologne. It was my father's. My mother gave it to me after he died. It's a subtle perfume so, to detect it, I had to be near him. When I spray it on (not something I do apart from "posh" occasions and now, less and less often, as it slowly empties) I am acutely reminded of my father, of his presence, of his absence.

The variety of smells in our modern world is much less than in Jesus', so much so that shops will sell us products that pump scent into our houses. The Gospel story, which circles around the subject of aroma, explores the sheer contrast of smells, good and bad, that daily assailed the nostrils of the first readers in a way which we might not fully understand.

The sense of smell telescopes our memories. Just as that eau-de-cologne vividly recalls my father, so the stench of daily living competing with the sweet, pungent smell of nard, will have given those disciples a sort of sensory and memory overload. On the one hand, earthy humanity, in all its wonderful, rich and sometimes slightly tricky aroma, recalled human capacity to do kind acts and immensely hurtful ones and, on the other hand, the fragrant, potent smell of nard, offered a contrast that rather wonderful spoke of beauty and grace and wonder breaking into ordinary life.

Maybe our worship ought to have a 'smell' about it? Maybe that would help us have a sense that we are about holy things and alert us to Jesus' presence?

If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh, I have more: circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless. forward to what lies ahead, I press on toward the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus.

Six days before the Passover Jesus came to Bethany, the home of Lazarus, whom he had raised from the dead. There they gave a dinner for him. The house was filled with the fragrance of the perfume.
