Time to Reflect

I am fascinated by authorised liturgy, by the words we use or don't use in worship, the things they say/don't say about God, about us and about what we think our lives are about. For instance, in the Book of Common Prayer, in the Prayer for Church Militant, the writer carefully phrases what he thinks we can say about the departed; we can ask God 'to give us grace so to follow their good examples'. If you are a devotee of the BCP, Cranmer considered praying for 'those we love but see no longer' heretical. Lighting candles for our loved ones is a waste of time, apparently. Common Worship is more nuanced.

Our first reading from Acts would agree with Cranmer's wording. We are presented with an ideal, a woman, Tabitha (the only woman in the whole of the New Testament to be called a Disciple by the way). The ideal she sets before us, her 'good example', is neatly set out as 'good works, acts of charity' and making clothes. Many is the church that has relied on such women, industriously pouring out their lives for others, generously giving of their skills and talents to make life better. I am sure that you and I can name many such women. Churches should note this ministry, should name and give thanks appropriately. We shouldn't wait till they die.

Our Anglican liturgical language (BCP and CW) draws deeply from the scriptures. One key Easter reading, in Romans 6, talks about "Dying with Christ". Perhaps Tabitha's example reminds us that we should equally seek to 'live for others'? Thank God for Tabithas.

A Reading from the Acts of the Apostles

(Acts 9.36-43)

Now in Joppa there was a disciple whose name was Tabitha, which in Greek is Dorcas. She was devoted to good works and acts of charity. At that time she became ill and died. When they had washed her, they laid her in a room upstairs. Since Lydda was near Joppa, the disciples, who heard that Peter was there, sent two men to him with the request, "Please come to us without delay." So Peter got up and went with them; and when he arrived, they took him to the room upstairs. All the widows stood beside him, weeping and showing tunics and other clothing that Dorcas had made while she was with them. Peter put all of them outside, and then he knelt down and prayed. He turned to the body and said, "Tabitha, get up." Then she opened her eyes, and seeing Peter, she sat up. He gave her his hand and helped her up. Then calling the saints and widows, he showed her to be alive. This became known throughout Joppa, and many believed in the Lord. Meanwhile he stayed in Joppa for some time with a certain Simon, a tanner. This is the word of the Lord
