Time to Reflect

What do you do when a man walks into church with a hat on? Those of a certain generation may find their reflex is to separate hat and head—or at least indicate that the owner should do so. To be honest. I have never seen what would be the entirely logical reverse, which is to put hats on all women walking into church (see 1 Corinthians 11 for details). Hopefully, we don't do either. To know why, take a close look at our reading from Acts (see over).

It might not read like it but this is a watershed moment. Not merely the stories about Jesus but evidence of the life-changing impact of Jesus has leaked; leaked across what were previously watertight boundaries between the Jewish and non-Jewish communities and Peter is confused. His whole life has been completely absorbed in policing those boundaries, keeping step with God in his daily life. Meeting Jesus, being drawn to Jesus, and now living up to Jesus' call to gather together others is fine in theory ... but now Peter begins to see that Jesus is attractive to people other than his fellow Jews. Peter is now no longer sure whether hats should be on or off. It's very confusing.

Except it shouldn't be, at least for us. For Peter, as the pioneer, this is hard and troubling and complicated. For us following behind him, Peter's costly discovery that Jesus is inclusive of all, should be so much easier. Sadly, often it isn't. We no longer worry about eating seafood but we worry about other boundaries, other differences, and we try to police them. Why? Often, I think, it is because we like control and find Jesus' inclusivity troubling.

A Reading from the Acts of the Apostles (A cts 11. 1-18)

Now the apostles and the believers who were in Judea heard that the Gentiles had also accepted the word of God. So when Peter went up to Jerusalem, the circumcised believers criticized him, saying, "Why did you go to uncircumcised men and eat with them?" Then Peter began to explain it to them, step by step, saying, "I was in the city of Joppa praying, and in a trance I saw a vision. There was something like a large sheet coming down from heaven, being lowered by its four corners; and it came close to me. As I looked at it closely I saw four-footed animals, beasts of prey, reptiles, and birds of the air. I also heard a voice saying to me, 'Get up, Peter; kill and eat.' But I replied, 'By no means, Lord; for nothing profane or unclean has ever entered my mouth.' But a second time the voice answered from heaven, 'What God has made clean, you must not call profane.' This happened three times; then everything was pulled up again to heaven. At that very moment three men, sent to me from Caesarea, arrived at the house where we were. The Spirit told me to go with them and not to make a distinction between them and us. These six brothers also

accompanied me, and we entered the man's house. He told us how he had seen the angel standing in his house and saving, 'Send to Joppa and bring Simon, who is called Peter; he will give you a message by which you and your entire household will be saved.' And as I began to speak, the Holy Spirit fell upon them just as it had upon us at the beginning. And I remembered the word of the Lord, how he had said. 'John baptized with water, but you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit.' If then God gave them the same gift that he gave us when we believed in the Lord Jesus Christ, who was I that I could hinder God?" When they heard this, they were silenced. And they praised God, saying, "Then God has given even to the Gentiles the repentance that leads to life."
