Starting out as a Christian or re-finding our faith and a new desire to practice following Jesus is exciting. Actually, it's more than that, something we forget or perhaps have never experienced. There's a sort of inner nudge to live differently, to respond differently, to see the world through new lenses. So, when we hear from Galatians, what we are listening into is some of that same energy, that same experience of being totally thrown by seeing the world in a new light. It's a bit of a roller-coaster read.

Our passage today takes the first, key, verse of Galatians 5 and then threads an argument from a bit later in the chapter. And that key idea is "Freedom": For freedom Christ has set us free Paul is naming one of most significant realities he has found; that to commit to Christ, to Jesus, is totally liberating. God is in the business of freeing his creation from bondage of any form. One way, for us, of judging whether something is "Christian" is whether, when we do it or say it or think it, love wins or whether someone or something loses their capacity to exercise freedom.

Paul tests out his idea in two ways. He catalogues a list of activities which, on their own, narrows our full humanity and imprisons others by our actions, the very opposite of freedom. Then he offers the "fruits of the Spirit", a cumulative list of what happens, step by step, when you give more space to Jesus and less to your ego. What happens, he says, is that a sense of freedom ripples out; freedom in our relationship with Christ, with others and in our own lives. Worth a punt, I would have thought?

A reading from the letter of Paul to the Galatians (Galatians 5.1,13-25)

For freedom Christ has set us free. Stand firm. therefore, and do not submit again to a voke of slavery. For you were called to freedom, brothers and sisters; only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for self-indulgence, but through love become slaves to one another. For the whole law is summed up in a single commandment, "You shall love your neighbour as yourself." If, however, you bite and devour one another, take care that you are not consumed by one another. Live by the Spirit, I say, and do not gratify the desires of the flesh. For what the flesh desires is opposed to the Spirit, and what the Spirit desires is opposed to the flesh; for these are opposed to each other, to prevent you from doing what you want. But if you are led by the Spirit, you are not subject to the law. Now the works of the flesh are obvious: fornication, impurity, licentiousness, idolatry, sorcery, enmities, strife, jealousy, anger, quarrels, dissensions, factions, envy, drunkenness, carousing, and things like these. I am warning you, as I warned you before: those who do such things will not inherit the kingdom of God. By contrast, the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness,

gentleness, and self-control. There is no law against such things. And those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires. If we live by the Spirit, let us also be guided by the Spirit.
